


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Livestock Production Cycle – A Framework



The Planning Aspect of Raising Livestock

- Considerations
 - Which species do you plan to raise?
 - Where will you obtain the animals?
 - How many animals do you plan to raise?
 - When will you obtain the animals?
 - Do you know what it is going to take to raise the animals? care, feed, space, time, etc.
 - What are your expectations? meat, milk, fiber
 - What is your exit strategy?


Limiting Factors

- Availability of preferred species
- Space (facilities, pasture, etc.)
- Feed (grain price, hay price)
- Equipment (essentials)
- Time to provide proper care for animals
- Physical strength to care for animals
- Slaughter site and date (appointment)
- Transport to slaughter site
- Freezer space (yourself and customers)

How much <u>time</u> is needed to raise animals to market weight?

- Rate of weight gain is influenced by:
 - The breed of the animals
 - Individual animal genetics
 - The age of the animal
 - Grouping of animals (competition)
 - How much the animals is fed (quantity)
 - What the animal is fed (feed quality)
 - Health of the animal
 - Environment & weather
 - Overall care provided

Poultry Production Cycles

Broiler	6-8 weeks	4.5 to 6.5 lbs
Roaster	8-10 weeks	7 to 12 lbs
Turkey	16-20 weeks	12-25 lbs
Duck	6-8 weeks	~ 5 lbs
Geese	6-8 weeks	~ 8 lbs
Guinea Fowl	8-14 weeks	~ 5 lbs

Consider Raising Livestock from Spring to Fall (No Winter Care)

- Grass is abundant from spring to fall.
- No permanent building is necessary to house livestock from spring to fall.
- Winter forages are expensive.
- Winter care in labor intensive.
- Most animals will reach market weight before winter.

Slaughter Options

- Do it yourself
- Pay a processor
 - custom, state inspected or USDA inspected
